# TWENTIETH REUNION Washington, DC

Having the Twentieth Reunion in our Nation's Capital was exactly the right choice and everyone seemed so pleased with the tours and events that were so well planned and prepared. There was no doubt that seeing the World War II memorial was one of the highlights, if not the highlight of the trip. Many of us had not seen it since it was finished a few years ago and this was so appropriate for our veterans and their wives. What better way to recognize them for all they sacrificed so many years ago.

The troops began to gather at the McLean Hilton on Tuesday, well in advance of the reunion dates of 14-17 September, and many of us did some private sight-seeing and meeting with old friends. It was a chance to spin-up for the exciting times meeting with

our Group friends and taking all those photos and hashing over old and not-so-old times we've had together over the years. It was also a chance to meet new friends.

Thursday was check-in for most of our troops and also the day the Board met to make decisions on this and the next reunion. We solidified plans for this reunion with slight adjustments being made in times and locations to accommodate changes in availability, etc. A vote was taken and passed on keeping the Reunions on a bi-annual plan, with the 21st being in 2008. That reunion location was voted on and accepted to be in Dayton, Ohio with the plan including visiting and possibly using the Air Force Museum. The more central location will hopefully attract more members to attend with hopefully more reasonable travel costs and distance.

Friday morning began very early for some, as at 8:00 the first Next Generation (NexGen) meeting was held to gather all those who might be interested in perpetuating the legacy of the 384th through assisting the Group in planning, funding and executing future 384th BG operations, including reunions, gatherings, preservation of artifacts and recording history. All who attended are invited to join the 384th as associate members and help us sup-

At 9:30 we boarded buses and headed downtown to the memorials, with the first stop being at the Korean memorial. The Korean memorial gave us all exactly the feeling I think it was meant to . . . they were ghost-like figures of soldiers in that "forgotten" war and brought alive some of the visions of that war. We walked from there to the Victnam memorial, probably the most celebrated memorial in DC, and

then boarded the buses for the short trip to the other end of the Reflecting Pool where the WWII memorial is located. This is a very well laid-out memorial with so much information and fantastic bas reliefs that told many stories.

After a very rushed lunch in Union Station, which is rich in architectural beauty, we headed for Arlington Cemetery for a tram tour of part of this vast resting place for so many heroes. The tram took us to John F. Kennedy's gravesite and also provided us with a panorama of the city of Washington. It was very interesting that Robert Kennedy's grave is marked with the only wooden cross in the entire cemetery. From there we hurried over to the Tomb of the Unknowns to witness the precision demonstrated in the changing of the guards. This was a very special treat for all of us to see and will undoubtedly remain vivid in our memories for a long time.

Friday evening found all of us at the no-host cocktail party which preceded the evening dinner. This was a great opportunity to cha with friends old and new and learn more about our Group's legacy first-hand from our heroes. The day was a very busy one and we al retired at a respectable hour in preparation for the following day's events.

The first order of business upon arrival at the museum was to take a group photo of all attending veterans in front of the Boeing Model 307, an airliner based mostly on the B-17 and the closest aircraft they have at the moment to our famed Flying Fortress. We had 30 guys posing for photos and about 20 cameras or more flashing at them. It was really a magical moment that seemed to attract cameras like the true heroes they are. We then took photos of the guys who were on the first and last missions of the European War. The rest of the afternoon was free to wander about the expansive new NASM to see all the great displays from WWI through current fighter aircraft like the F-35. I believe the Enola Gay was the most impressive of all.

Saturday evening turned out to be the grandest of all balls. At the cocktail lounge there were dozens of our people wandering around trying to photograph as many people as they could, thinking they didn't want to miss the chance to record this evening of comradeship and memory-making. As we were "chimed" into the ballroom for an exquisite dinner, the music of Glenn Miller could be heard and many folks seemed to be dancing their way to their tables to drop purses and coats and then VFR to the dance floor. It was as if the Pied Piper were drawing everyone to the floor. It was magic and the whole evening progressed that way leading all of us to not want it to end. 




View up Mall from Lincoln Memorial



#### 2006 REUNION

The 384th B.G. (H) 2006 Reunion is now part of history, nearly 30 veterans attended and with dependents the total was 100.

It was always nice meeting old friends, regretably some familiar faces were missing. From my point of view some of the veterans I had not seen for 30 years. As ever the Reunion was a great success. Most poinent was the visit to Arlington Cemetery where the remains of over 270,000 veterans are interned. What a price freedom has.

The tour of the US Capital was a real experience as one was able to see for real the sites we have heard of, Jefferson Memorial, Lincoln Memorial, White House and the future Air Force Memorial to name but a few.

The tour of the National Air and Space Museum at Dulles airport was quite an eye opener, the size of the space shuttle was mind blowing and to see the Enola Gay close up was to see a true piece of history. The pilot of Enola Gay, Paul Tibbetts flew as pilot of a B-17 of the 97th B.G. (H) when this unit flew the very first mission of the Eighth Army Air Force when they bombed the railway marshallling yards at Rouen France on August 17th, 1942. This mission was flown from the airfield here at Grafton-Underwood and all we all know the 384th B.G. (H) had the distinction of dropping the last bombs carried by the Eighth U.S.A.A. from England in World War II when from the same airfield they bombed the Skoda Works at Pilsen Czechslovakia on the 25th April 1945.

At the Board of Directors meeting it was decided the next Reunion would be held at Dayton, Ohio in 2008. Dayton is the home of Wright Patterson A.F.B. which houses the largest collection of aircraft in the world. The 384th B.G. (H) has a MemorialTree planted by members many years ago along with other artifacts.

The NexGen, that is offspring from veterans had meetings and decided on future projects that would keep the flame burning for the 384th in the future.

The 2006 Reunion was a great success and 2008 will be here before we know it, so make a date for 2008.
