alth him and the rest of our journey was errenged.

14 July 1943

We left our Base at 0600 hours 14 July 1943 and were over the target (VILLACOUBLAY) at 0830 hours. While on the bomb-run our number one engine was hit by flak. We were in formation until our bombs were dropped and after that about twenty fighters attacked. I tried to get down to deck but at 10000 feet there was nothing left of the plane to fly. Number one and number four engines were out. All the superchargers were gone. Number two was throwing oil. The tail rudder was missing. Two 20 mm shells had burst in the rear of the pilot's compartment taking out the oxygen system.

DAMAGED BY FLAK AND FIGHTERS

As soon as I gave the order to put on parachutes the tail-gumner baled out. Sgt WOODSTOCK followed him. The wounded engineer and co-pilot went out the bomb-bay and the navigator, bombardier and I used the nose hatch. I stayed in the plane until everyone was out.

I tried a delayed jump but fortunately did not wait too long because

PARACHUTE DIDN'T OPEN PROPERLY the chute failed to open when I pulled the ripcord. I had to pull the silk out of the case which I didn't find difficult and finally got it open around 2000 feet. There were two chutes above me and one on the ground. Our plane was circling above me when I last saw it. An ME 109 buzzed me but did not shoot. While I was coming down I watched the layout of the woods below me to decide how to get out of them quickly.

JOINED BY CREW MEMBERS I landed in a tree and was suspended about three feet above the ground. This was 20 miles southwest of PARIS. A young French boy was there to help me and by the time he had cut down my parachute, Sgts RUBY and GREEN of my crew were brought to join me. The chute was torn into bandages for our wounds. A Frenchwoman motioned us to come to her house which was within sight of our landing but we knew it was too dangerous. After getting our directions from the French we walked in the direction of PARIS. We had two escape Kits and Purses.

EVADES GERMAN SEARCH After covering four miles we arrived at a large highway which we were afraid to cross because there was very little cover on the opposite side. It seemed best to hide. We chose a small grove of trees which was not a part of the large wood we had been walking in. The next day we learned this larger wood had been searched by 200 Germans.

SECURES FRENCH HELP It was our intention to walk into PARIS after dark but later in the day my knee and hip, injured by flak, were bothering me so much that we decided to go to a farmhouse for help. On the way into a small village we met a Frenchman walking through the fields and waved to him. He told us he was looking for us, and that earlier in the day one of our crew members had passed that way. He had given this evader clothes and offered further help but the evader knew an address in PARIS and wanted to go there. (Nothing has been heard since of this evader.) We went to this Frenchman's house with him and the rest of our journey was arranged.

## SGT GREEN'S STORY BEFORE JOINING LT MUNDAY:

SEES PLANE EXPLODE

I baled out at 10000 feet after Sgts WOODSTOCK, RUBY and MILES. Sgt JOHNSON was ready to jump after me. I saw one chute on the ground and watched our plane crash and explode in an open field.

I landed in a tree but about six Frenchmen were there to help me get down. A boy on a bicycle came up to tell me that one of my 'camarades' was nearby. He took me to LT MUNDAY.

# APPENDIX "B" TO E AND E REPORTS NOS. 104 & 105

- 1. The following information has been obtained after an interview with an Officer and a Sergeant who evaded capture by the enemy, after being in enemy-occupied territory.
- 2. Further circulation of this information may be made, but when doing so, no information as to the source may be divulged.

Statement of information covering period from 14 July 1943 to 19 September 1943

- 1. Heard that the damage to VILLACOUBLAY 14 July 1943 was very extensive. About 150 aircraft were destroyed. Little damage was done to LE BOURGET, bombed on the same day. (hearsay)
- 2. Heard that the second attack on LE BOURGET was very effective with 1200 field personnel being killed, including a General.
- 3. Saw a large airfield two miles southwest of TOULOUSE with several JU 88's flying over the field. Seven large, well-camouflaged, canvas hangars were seen.
- 4. Roads and sidewalks leading into PARIS being mined. Mines can be electrically operated and are set for tanks weights. (observation and hearsay)
