GRAFTON-UNDERWOOD 26 June 1943

TAIL GUNNER

We left GRAFTON-UNDERWOOD at 1430 hours 26 June 1943 to bomb the Renault Works, PARIS. Flak, as we flew over IE HAVRE, was intense and accurate. Our number two engine was hit causing us to lag behind the formation. Enemy fighters attacked and our port wing was set on fire. When the alarm bell rang I destroyed all my radio equipment and went into the waist because the thick smoke had filled the radio compartment. The two waist gunners were lying, as if dead, by the ball-turret. An FW was coming in on us again so I grabbed the waist gun and gave him two long bursts. He blew up in mid-air.

PLANE IN SPIN

Our plane stalled and went into a spin. I was thrown against the roof and as soon as we straightened out again I went to the waist door and kicked my way out because the door would not salvo. I was knocked out when my head struck the tail. I was holding the rip cord and when I recovered consciousness my chute was open. An FW circled me until I went into heavy cloud. Thbresog ma:

ARRANGED THREE

I landed in a field and was gathering in my chute when several Frenchmen ran up to me. One of them washed the cuts on my face with wine and then led me to a barn. I slept in the hay until dark when

- 1. The following information has been obtained after an interview with a Sergeant who evaded capture by the enemy, after being in enemyoccupied territory.
- 2. Further circulation of this information may be made, but when doing so, no information as to the source may be divulged.

Statement of information covering period from 26 June 1943 to 10 September 1943

- MILITARY 1. A German gunnery school was located in a wood about a mile from COURTONNE LA VILLE. July 1943

  On a day early in July, ten unidentified tanks were seen in COURTONNE LA VILLE.
- - 3. Many aircraft, ME-109's and FW 190's, seen flying over COURTONNE LA VILLE from an airport located several kilometers northwest of that village. July 1943
  - 4. The wreckage of a B-17 was seen on a flat-car at CAEN.
  - MILITARY 5. Heard that many German troops were in PARIS on leave from the Russian front.
  - 6. Was told that the Hotel Continental, PARIS, is used as a prison MILITARY and that an average of thirty Frenchmen a week were being executed there.
