SUBJECT: Safeguarding of P/W Information.

TO : Personnel concerned.

- 1. It is the duty of all Americans to safeguard information which might, either directly or indirectly, be useful to the enemy.
- 2. It is an offense, carrying heavy penalties, to publish or to communicate to any unauthorized person any information which might be useful to the enemy.
- 3. Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SECRET.
- 4. a. You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations:

(1) The names of those who helped you.

(2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.

3) The route you followed.

(4) Any other facts concerning your experience.

- b. You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the Press.
- c. You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
- d. You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4a.
- e. No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of the War or Navy Department.

held the plane to the last minute.

Between 0930 and 1030 on 4 July 1943 we took off from GRAFTON UNDERWOOD to bomb the aircraft factory at Le MANS. For some reason we were forced out of posijust tion, over the French coast. (See sketches, Appendix E.) We went in at 24,000 feet and met little flak until the target and only light flak there. We dropped our bombs, but I did not see what happened to them. When we were heading back for home, we were attacked by many Me 109's and a few FW 190's. Some of the FW 190's had the yellow nose of Herman Goering's boys. Number one engine was hit and set on fire. We were knocked completely out of formation, and we lost altitude. Our oxygen system was shot up. Fighters came in on us from all sides and hit two more motors. When the pilot gave the order to bail out, the whole plane was on fire. We shot by 1990 down one Me 109, for I saw it blow up in mid-air. I thought Sgt MANKOWITZ got it, but the waist gunner might have done the job. The pilot

I went out the waist compartment hatch. The emergency stuck and would not work, so I leaned against the door and fell out. Sgt ASHWORTH was ready tofollow me out. I think I jumped at 18,000 feet. I went out with a bail-out bottle and made a delayed jump. I was the low man among the parachutes I saw in the air. I saw five other parachutes. On the way down German fighters circled me, and I fewred they were going to fire on me, but they did not.

I landed in a field which had recently been mowed and was howked knocked unconscious by the fall impact. When I recovered consciousness, a Frenchman was at my side. He lead me to a farmhouse where I saw Sgt ASHWORTH already changing into civilian clothes in a barn. The French took care of my mae west, flying clothes, and parachute. Sgt ASHWORTH and I were taken to a hedgerow and hid. Soon our pilot and engineer were brought to the same place. The Germans were hunting for us with planes overhead and motorcyclists on the ground. Five gendarmes found us, but they gave us wine and some cigarettes. We stayed where we were all that afternoon and night.

While we fre were there, a woman who could speak a little English came and

The next day the Germans were still searching for us. We stayed where we were.

The next night we moved to another hedgerow where the cover was even better. From there I was carried on a stretcher to a place where I met Sgt MANKOWITZ, and our journey was arranged for us.

Sgt MANKOWITZ:

When German planes came in At/A on our tail, I was hit in the leg by a bullet.

After we cleared the fighters.

The interphone was out, so I went back in the plane to see what was happening forward. I saw that they were still watching for fighters up in front, so I went back to my gun. /Viehter German fighters came in on us again, and I fired. I thought I hit an Me 109. After we cleared this group, I looked back to see what was going on and saw Sgt WINGETER trying to open the waist door. I motioned to him to come back to the tail to go out. Dur oxygen system had been shot out, and I was having some trouble breathing. I saw Sgt WINGETER coming back to the tail, so I bailed out. I saw only one parachute in the air, and I thought it was his.

I made a delayed jump for a short time by failing to pull the proper cord.

I landed in a field about 200 yards from a farmhouse. I limped to the farm

house and asked for water. The woman at the farmhouse did not seem glad to see

ary, pointed to the word for Intelligence and then for Service, and then pointed to himself. He hid me in a hayfield and brought me some dortors and some food.

I heard Germans patroling the roads, but they did not search where I was. I

was moved to another outdoor hiding place that night. The next night I was

carried on a stretcher to a place where I met Sgt FREEMAN, and from there our

journeys were arranged.

- 1. The following information has been obtained in an interview with two sergeants who evaded capture by the enemy after being in enemy occupied territory.
- 2. Further circulation of the information may be made, but in that case it is important not to divulge any particulars about the source.
  - /3// Statement of information covering the period 4 July 1943 to 18 November 1943
- a. The occupational forces troops in LYONS in September and October were found either quite young or quite old. Some were ho/black/than/16/bt/17/ only 16 or 17 years old. There were many men who had served on the Russian front.
- b. Frenchmen told me that there is an airdrome in the south east part of the city. They said it was used at least in part for training pilots.
  - c. We saw a lot of Luftwaffe men around LYONS in Spetember and October.
- d. I saw some German Ju 87's used for training purposes around LYONS, but I never saw more than four together. I also saw some German seaplanes flying over LYONS.
- e. There is an airfield north north east of LYONS in the vicinity of FLEUR-IEU and MONTANAT. I saw Ju 87's and Me 110's going and coming to it.
- f. In early November we saw German troops in LYONS whom the French said belonged to the AVIXAXON Afrikakorps.
- g. Around 23 August we saw a trainload of wounded Germans come into LYONS from the south.
