We left GRAFTON UNDERWOOD 26 June 1943 to bomb VILLACOUBLAY. The first enemy fighter I saw came in for a low frontal attack on the opposite side from the number one engine which was hit by this time. Sgt KUBERSKI showed me where shells had entered the fuselage and dented the armor plating but we couldn't see where the attack was coming from. We fought the FW's all the way out until leaving the plane. I knew we had several bad hits but was too busy with my guns to see where. I heard the engineer having a discussion over the 'inter-com' about feathering an engine. Just after I heard the order to bale out, I heard a bang and someone said something about number three engine. The plane had gone into a dive but the pilot must have levelled it off soon after that. Our ball-turret gunner came into the waist and I saw the radio operator behind him. Sgt KUBERSKI yanked the release on the waist door and jumped. I followed him immediately. I think I jumped around 12000 feet and opened my chute around 11000 feet.

On the way down fighters circled once to look me over. I had to play with the shroud lines to avoid high tension wires and had my right hand caught around a broken leg post under me

chute. I hid it with the Mae West in a wheat field. I know that Sgt KUBERSKI had landed near me so I started limping in that direction. On the way I met a Frenchman and after showing him where I had hidden my chute he took me to a field. Sgt KUBERSKI was brought to the field we were in by another Frenchman. We went into a wood to hid and soon a French farmer came to the wood looking for us. He had a French-English dictionary and after talking to him our journey was arranged for us.

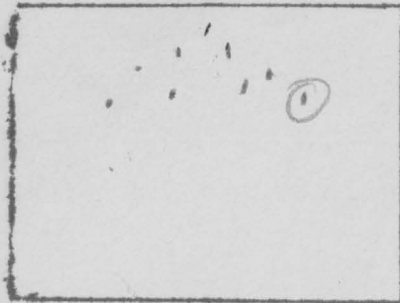

SUBJECT: Safeguarding of P/W Information.

TO : Personnel concerned.

1. It is the duty of all Americans to safeguard information which might, either directly or indirectly, be useful to the enemy.
2. It is an offense, carrying heavy penalties, to publish or to communicate to any unauthorized person any information which might be useful to the enemy.
3. Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SECRET.
4. a. You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations:
  - (1) The names of those who helped you.
  - (2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.
  - (3) The route you followed.
  - (4) Any other facts concerning your experience.
- b. You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.
- c. You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
- d. You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4a.
- e. No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of the War or Navy Department.

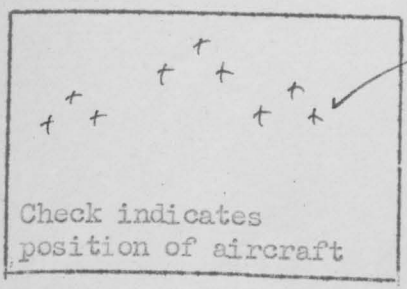
