TOUR OF OPERATIONS

MISSION #1

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Monday, September 25, 1944

First Mission - Target: Frankfurt Marshalling Yards. Plenty of fighter support. Flak fairly concentrated and moderate with pretty good accuracy. Received one flak hole in plexiglass nose. Missed Wehe but small flying pieces just scratched his throat. Saw B-17 just ahead of us get direct hit in waist and split in two. Tail end went right under us. Front end nosed straight down. No chutes seen, Made two runs on the target. Never dropped bombs. Saw B-24 & B-17 collide. Not very serious though. Really made a boner coming back. Were an H.C. ship and peeled out of formation 45 minutes too early. Really sweated it out... found home base alright though.

(No. one now a thing of the past)

Tuesday, September 26, 1944 6:30

Target: Osnabruck Steel Mills.

Fighter support good again. Plenty of little friends around. Made one bomb run. Dropped 5-1,000 lb. G.P.

Plenty of barrage flak at target.

Inaccurate though and no hits were scored by Jerry on our wing. He also sent up smoke trails. Could see ground today and thought it quite an experience to watch the ack ack guns firing at us and see the red flame come out of the guns.

All in all, mission ran very smooth.

(No. 2 now a thing of the past. Getting to be quite a veteran at this game) 3 Hednesday- Sept 27. Jurget - Coloration Party Valled Support There I flak. Trobody got but flak. Tolody got but flak. P. Really but taget. There is a position. Of Col. Inithis. Illing inother small mission.

Wednesday, September 27, 1944 7:05

Target: Cologne Marshalling Yards Happy Valley. Fighter support
there. Light flak - nobody got
hurt. Dropped 12-500 lb. G.P.
Really hit target. Flew No. 3
position off Col. Smith's wing.
Another smooth mission.

Thursday, September 28, 1944

9:00

Target: Magdeburg - Flak and tank
manufacturing factory. Fighter
support really all around. Plenty
of flak. One hit in No. one engine.
Made two bomb runs on target. Dropped
10-500 M-17 I.B. Intercepted another
B-17 squadron just after target. Two
of our ships collided in mid-air.
Lead ship had two engines out and
forced down in Belgium. Saw B-17
get direct hit, explode and
disintegrate into nothing. On way
back, we feathered No. one engine
when over English coast. Really
glad to get back from this one.

Structory. Oct 3 Cologne- fignthetic Cittle fighter support around our ship one flak hole on left wing top Bandile reported in the area but never attacked me. Dropped 10-500 G.P. made a real

Tuesday, October 3, 1944

7:20

Cologne-Synthetic Oil Plant. Very little fighter support. Plenty of flak all around our ship. One flak hole in left wing tip. Bandits reported in the area but never attacked us. Dropped 10-500 G.P.

Made a real mess out of the target.

Thursday, October 5, 1944 - 7:25

Cologne - Ford Motor Plant. Plenty of fighter support visible by dense contrails. Roughest mission ever been on or hope to be on. Went through about 30 minutes of continuous flak in center of Happy Valley due to lead navigator being off course. Got plenty of flak holes. One shell went completely through No. 4 engine knocking out supercharger. Two holes in plexiglass nose. One small hole and flak embedded in chest of Wehe's flak suit. Other piece of flak completely knocked out nose ventilator door and embedded in ammunition box. Plexiglass really flew in all directions. big chunk hit me square in the head. Thank my lucky stars I had my flak helmet on. Kept three pieces of glass as souvenirs. Some more flak ripped through left wing and embedded in radio room. Also got pieces of flak through glass of tail. Wright got little glass in his eye but nothing serious. Dropped 12-500 G.P. Really surprised we came out of this one. Expected to walk back from this mission. We lost two planes, of which one landed in Belgium. Jerry really threw up everything he had. Luckily no fighter hit us. Forgot to mention we made three bomb runs. Sweated out gas on way back. Came in alone. Glad to have landed.

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Monday, October 9, 1944 8:00

Target: Schweinfurt Aircraft Factory.

Flew off Colonel Smith's Wing.

Missed all of the flak area. Best fighter support ever seen. Sky was filled with little friends. No hits scored by Jerry. No. enemy fighters. Dropped 10-500 lb. G.P.

A dream mission. Wish they could all be this smooth and easy.

Wednesday, October 11, 1944

7:15

Koblenz Marshalling Yards. Little flak around our ship and no hits on our plane. But squadrons going to Cologne got pretty well shot up. Lost four aircraft out of our bomb group. On bomb run No. 4, supercharger gave out and we really lagged behind formation. Caught up though after bombs away. Dropped 5-1,000 lb. G.P. Coming back got our first glimpse of a jet plane in the distance climbing straight up. Never attacked us though. Jerry also threw up some smoke bombs but never scored any hits. Another smooth mission for us but not so for some of the other boys. We've really been lucky.

Thursday, October 19, 1944

7:50

Target: Mannheim Tank Factory. Had trouble going over. Siphoning of gas in No. 2 engine. Right hand oxygen ran out in about 5 minutes. At target, flak intense. Only got two hits. One piece in waist bouncing off gunner's helmet. Other went through side window of pilot's side. Missed Fred who was flying first pilot today. Otherwise, everything went okay. Plenty of fighter support. Went to 30,000 today to avoid clouds. Highest altitude yet.

propelled planes. One shot down
a P-51. Never attacked our formation
though. No flak hits in our ship.
Pretty nice mission and comparatively
easy.

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Thursday, November 2, 1944

6:35

Target: Duisburg Synthetic Oil
Plant. Dropped 20-250 G.P. Bombed
G.H. Moderate flak. No hits on
our plane. Really a nice smooth
mission. Should all be like this.
Today makes an even dozen missions.
Getting up there slow but sure.

Saturday, November 4, 1944

6:55

Target: Essen Synthetic Oil Plant.

Dropped 20-250 G.P. Bombed G.H.

Fairly intense flak. Plenty of

bursts by the nose, but no hits

scored. Coming back, spotted about

14 jet propelled planes. Eight of

them were at ten o'clock, ready to

dive in at us, but instead peeled off

and headed back to Germany. My

nose guns were charged and was

really ready to pour lead in their

direction. Got back okay.

Feel relieved now that No. 13 is past.

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Monday, November 6, 1944

7:00

Target: Essen Synthetic Oil Plant.

Dropped 20-250 G.P. Bombed G.H.

Loads of flak but plenty inaccurate.

Maybe Jerry is losing his grip but

I'm thankful for it. Spotted one
jet in the distance, coming over

Zuider Zee but never bothered us.

Fairly smooth mission.

5:20

Target: Gelsenkirchen Synthetic Oil
Plant. Dropped 20-250 G.P. Bombed
G.H. Moderate flak and inaccurate.
Plenty of P-51 fighter support.
No hits scored. Tail gunner though
seen a plane go down. Didn't know
whether fighter or B-17.

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Thursday, November 16, 1944

7:15

Target: Eschweiler. In support of ground troops. Dropped 30-260 Frag. bombs. Bombed G.H. Flew first mission deputy lead. Smooth mission with meager flak. Got left wing chewed off. Coming back, our field was closed in so we landed at Stratford Shakespeare's home. Stayed there for two days until our field opened up.

Monday, November 20, 1944

8:30

Target: Munster Marshalling Yards.

Dropped 20-250 G.P. Moderate flak
with no hits scored. Saw a V-2 on
the way back. Again our field was
closed in, so after making two
unsuccessful tries to land, we were
diverted to Bassingbourne. Stayed
there 2 hours then came back. Second
deputy lead.

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Saturday, November 25, 1944

11:00

Plant. Dropped 10-500 G.P. Bombed P.F.F. Loads upon loads of barrage flak but inaccurate. Thankful for that because it could have been very rough. Expected fighter opposition but didn't get any. For third time, our field was closed in, so were diverted to Aldermeston which is 8 mi. S.W. of Reading. Stayed there overnight and what a night. Slept in tents and just about froze to death.

MISSION #19

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Flew his fust lead
and did a good job.

Wednesday, November 29, 1944

7:50

Target: Hannover Oil Refining Plant.

Bombed P.F.F. Dropped 12-500 G.P.

Expected luftwaffe in strength so had plenty of fighter cover. Flak at target was meager and was surprising since we were briefed for intense. Little friends certainly do look good. Pretty good mission all around. Bill flew his first lead and did a good job.

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Monday, December 11, 1944

7:00

Target: Ludwigshafen Railroad
Bridge. Bombed P.F.F. Dropped
2-2,000 lb. flak meager and not
too accurate. Really sweated plenty
of weather on way back. Flew
through a front, got plenty of ice
on plane and lost formation twice.
Find them later and came back okay.

MISSION #21

Just last of every solvent of sol

Tuesday, January 2, 1945

7:35

Target: Gerolstein Marshalling
Yards. Just east of enemy salient
and was in support of ground troops.
Bombed visually and dropped 18-250
G.P. and 2 M-17 - I.B. Really
plastered the target. Flew deputy
lead again. Encountered only
about 6-8 bursts of flak. Made the
bomb runs. Nice mission.

Wednesday, January 3, 1944

7:00

Target: St. Vith - about 7 miles from the battle front. Carried 20-250 G.P.'s Turned from I.P. and proceeded on bomb run when a cylinder in No. 3 engine blew out and ripped off the cowling. Had to feather engine. Some of the cowling stuck to wing between No.3 and No. 4. Other pieces flew back and hit stabilizer cutting it. Plane vibrated violently and we were losing altitude. After about 15 miles down the bomb run, we decided to abort. Coming back, plane settles down a bit and we made it home alone although arriving after the mission since we couldn't make much speed. Really thought we were going to hit the silk today. Came back over England at about 200 ft. Made a good landing with full bomb load and only three engines. deputy again today.

Friday, January 5, 1945

8:45

Nieder Breisig Landing Field. Carried 38-100 G.P. Bombed G.H. No flak at target but coming back over Rhine, we received very accurate flak. Couple of bursts really lifted up the plane. Piece of flak came through bottom of plexiglass nose missing Wehe's foot, coming past and knocking off my oxygen mask, plus puncturing a hole in it. I had just moved back from the Gee box when it hit. Just about a second early and I probably would have had it through the head. Today certainly was my lucky day. Kept the piece of flak, also the torn oxygen mask. mission was alright. Came back alone sweating out a little weather plus gas which really wasn't bad. Flew deputy again.

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Saturday, February 3, 1945 9:20

Target: Berlin. Carried 10-500 G.P. Was a beautiful visual target. Could see Berlin for at least 30 miles away. Our group was the second over the target. Led our squadron. Really pranged our target. S-2 reports we hit Gestapo headquarters. Seen all the bombs hit with plenty of buildings and railroad going up in smoke and fire. Flak was pretty intense and fairly accurate. After bombs away, flak hit oil line in No. 2 engine and spurted oil all over the engine causing a little flame which rapidly extinguished. Had to feather the engine and came back on three, leading the squadron. If trouble would have occurred, was set to head for Russia since the lines weren't far away. A nice mission and one of the best targets we've had yet.

Thursday, February 15, 1945

Target: Dresden. Carried 18-250
G.P. 10-10 clouds most of the way.
Target was obscured so we bombed
P.F.F. Was a long mission but we
had good fighter support. Were up
for about 10 hours and 7 being on
oxygen. Only had one flak burst
over the target but had a few when
crossing the Rhine and front lines.
Nobody got hurt coming back. Our
field was socked in so we were
diverted to Bassingbourne for two
days. Had a good time one night
in Cambridge. Now have only 5
more missions to go. Flew deputy.

Friday, February 23, 1945

10:20

Target: Plauen. Carried 11-500

G.P. and one smoke bomb. Most of

Germany obscured by clouds so

bombing was done P.F.F. New tactics

used today in that we bombed from

13,000'. After bombs away, our ship

lurched, meaning we had felt the

concussion of the bombs hitting.

No flak on the whole trip, not even

at the target. Flew lead again

today. Had little trouble with

weather over England on return, but

made it back okay.

4 more to go.

Wednesday, March 7, 1945 8:00

Target: Giessen - Center of Town with Railroad Yards. Carried 12-500 G.P. Flew high squadron lead. The whole trip was overcast not being able to see the ground once. Our primary was G.H. near Dortmund. After hitting I.P., lead reported its Gee out, so we took over group. Were going swell half way down bomb run when Gee acted up; consequently, went way past target. Decided to give it up and go bomb secondary P.F.F. which was Giessen. Encountered scattered flak over primary with no flak at secondary P.F.F.. Bombing believed to be good and center of city hit. Came back alright avoiding little weather.

Just 3 left.

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Monday, March 12, 1945

7:30

Marshalling Yards. Carried 34-100
G.P. and 2-500 I.B. Flew low
squadron lead. All of continent
obscured by clouds, so bombed
G.H. No fighters or flak. Really
a smooth dream mission. Need
couple more like this.

Only 2 left.

Friday, March 23, 1945

6:15

Target: Gladbeck Marshalling Yards. Carried 34-150 G.P. and 2-500 I.B. Flew high squadron lead. base to target and back was visual with no clouds. Really pranged our target and knocked it out. Could see good results where other groups bombed. Saw the biggest smoke screen reported in history laid down by our troops along the front beside the Rhine. Big push will probably come any day. Flak at target was moderate but accurate. Ship of leads left wing got direct hit, spun a little, then exploded. Doran and McMorrow No chutes seen. finished up today and I only have one last one to go. Today was most beautiful weather ever seen. Visual all the way. Jerry really took a beating today.

Saturday, March 31, 1945

8:40

Target: Halle Railroad Yards.

Carried 20-300 G.P.'s. Flew low squadron lead. Most of mission covered by 10/10 clouds. Bombed target P.F.F. with scattered bursts of flak. On way back, seen Remagen bridge down and 4 or 5 pontoon bridges up over the Rhine. Seen loads of truck convuys heading for the front. Can now end this diary.

Tour of operations now completed.
