95th Bomb Group Kids By Linda Endris

I had an idea several months ago, but didn't want to pass it on until I saw how it worked. We have had such positive results, that I am ready to share it with you all.

In August I contacted the Principal at St. Barnabas School (where 5 of my grandchildren go) and asked if they would be interested in sending all the veterans in the 95th Bomb Group a card thanking them for their service. They said ves. so I sent them address labels that John Mollision was kind enough to make for me. I offered to send them with my cards so they wouldn't have to pay postage, but the children and teachers all donated stamps so they could send the cards directly. The teachers took the names they were given and researched the 95th Bomb Group and the individual men so they would know a little bit about the men they were writing to and what they

did during World War II.

The results of their efforts have been overwhelming! Many of the veterans wrote back to the children. The kids were absolutely thrilled to hear from the veterans. One veteran sent a check to the classroom to use for books, and another drew a picture of the B-17 and showed where the individual men sat and what they did. One veteran sent a book that he had written about his experiences. Others sent expressions of thanks and the letters brought tears to my eyes. In fact, one teacher told me the staff sat in the lunch room and read letters to each other and it was such an emotional experience for the teachers, as well as the children.

One of the veterans is blind so he had a neighbor read the letter to him and called me. He wants to call the child since he can't see to write, so he is going to call the school one day next week and they are putting him on speaker phone to talk to all the children. I have

heard from several veterans that after they wrote the thank-you notes, the children responded with pictures of their family, stories of what they like to do, etc. so maybe we have a lot of future "pen-pals".

I also heard from the Principal this morning that they would like to "adopt" this group of men and send birthday cards, Christmas cards, etc.

My point in telling you all this is that I am sure most of you have grandchildren who attend school. Maybe you could approach the principal of "your" school and suggest the same thing. Maybe one of you would want to use the widows list. Think of how happy the veterans and widows would be to get pictures and notes from the kids. We were talking about how to reach young people and maybe this could be a

Commemoration in France

On July 4th, 1943, F/O Gordon Erickson's B-17F, serial number 42-29960, was shot down after attacking an aircraft engine factory in Le Mans, France. The aircraft crashed near the small village of Belfonds, France. Of the crew, two were KIA, two were POW, and six evaded capture.

Having erected a memorial honoring this crew, the Belfonds Veterans Association will hold ceremonies of remembrance on Saturday, July 6th, this year. The following message from Mme. Sally Sorel explains the plan:

"Any and all US military, active or retired, vaca-

tioning in France or whatever, are cordially invited and will be housed and fêted by the villagers (including myself!)

"The little town of Belfonds has a steadfast commitment to preserving the memory of the crash and to honoring the memory of all those, both French and American, who lost their lives or fought there."

I urge all readers to reflect upon the deep appreciation these citizens of France have – so many years after WWII – of the price paid for their Freedom, and to think seriously about joining the good citizens of Belfonds, as well as political, military, and religious representatives, in ensuring an appropriate observance in honor of the 70^{th} anniversary of the event. If

More Info: To locate and possibly see this location in France, google "St Clair, Belfonds, France zip code 61500. Two of the crew reportedly fell at "Chene d'amour", which I believe is in the nearby village of La Ferrière Béchet. And airman Hackley reportedly landed at "val d'enfer" between Condé le Butor and Clérey church. The last two have been interred in the village of Belfonds.

As for the scheduled events on July 6th 2013:

9:30 Mass at Belfonds Church

11:00 Military Ceremony at the Memorial Site (followed by "un vin d'honneur" at the site)

12:30-12:45—Catered Luncheon at the Community Center in Belfonds (expect to last several hours!)

Dateline....13 April 2013

69 years ago today the 384th Bomb Group took off from Grafton Underwood, UK, Station 106 on a mission to the Ball Bearing Factories at Schweinfurt Germany. On this mission between the time of 13:54 and 13:57, 6 out of 7 B-17s from the 384th Bomb Group, 545th Bomb Squadron were shot down. My Uncle TSgt Joseph Rachunas was a Tailgunner on one of those planes and became a POW at Stalag 17B for the rest of the War. This is Ben's story!!

Ditching the Fort Revisited


We received very interesting confirmation of published ditching procedures from **Bob** Fisher... My first assignment after commissioning in 1947 was at Eglin with the 3200th Proof Test Group. Our job was to fly aircraft by remote radio control to test the validity of recommended procedures—like gear-up landings, unconventional maneuvers, and of course, ditching, all without risk to life.

Some had other opinions of jus how the B-17 should be ditched, such as stalling the plane

and letting it drop in at the lowest speed possible and, I believe, landing with one wing hitting just before the other to act as a "ground loop" on the water. We had extensive photo recording devices at crucial points inside and some outside to capture the resulting data.

Guess what? The recommended ditching procedure provided in the B-17 operating manual was the very best! The others caused much more damage up to catastrophic...

The pilot should attempt to set the airplane down in a trough, which is usually cross wind. The two outboard engines are used for control and to flatten the approach. The landing gear should be up, the flaps lowered medium, and the ignition switches cut a foot or so above the water.


Interesting Reading!

This mission and the 384th are highlighted in the Warriors section

of the book, and begins with information about my crew on page 67. Another very interesting crewmember on Jimmy's crew was Sergeant Olen "Reb" Grant. Reb was one of the waist gunners and provides a real glimpse into what it must have been like in the 384th in the early years.

Great Conversation Photo

There were quite a few e-mails flying around to discuss what was really happening in the photo above. We left it in a fairly large format so you can decide for yourself what you think was happening.

The photo is clearly marked, "Boeing B-17 Flying Fortresses flying over Bremen, Germany, November 13, 1943." But with many of us pointing out the details that we can find in the photo, we believe this was perhaps taken on an aborted mission to Bremen, and that they actually were not flying over Bremen when this picture was shot.

The photo came to us from Chris Wilkerson asking for help: "To my eye, this looks like a Triangle P on the tail. If it is, does anybody know

the story about this photo? Some have bombays open, some don't. White lines look like a scratch on the film, but I see a flare drop in the stick of bombs. Cloud cover is thick..."

Your editor replied, "I believe it is a 384th plane, and it looks like early in the war, since all are F-models. It may be that they are returning from an aborted mission (wx) and this guy is jettisoning his load. I say that because the pattern of bombs seems rather packed and not strung out as if released by intervelometer. Since it's early in the war, with thick undercast, my thought is they didn't have radar and so I believe they did not bomb that day."

Bill O'Leary answered: "Very interesting photo! The drop appears to me to be a salvo of incendiary clusters(?) Too many to be 500 pounders, plus bombs would have tail fins that allow them to drop nose down. Frank may be

correct about the reason for the drop from a single airplane. Chris, if the white line is not a scratch on the film, then we have a real mystery on our hands. I don't understand a "smoke bomb" drop from other than the lead airplane? The date of the photo would probably lead to answers for all our questions."
