Rates will be confirmed at \$129, and then the \$10 discount will be adjusted at the front desk. Please confirm the final rate of \$119 at check-in.

Cut Off Date: 25 Aug 2017. Late reservations will be processed based on space availability at a higher rate.

Cancellation Policy: Cancellations must be made 24 hours prior to arrival date. After this time a charge of one night's room plus tax will be charged to your credit card. An early check-out fee of \$50 will be charged if you depart the hotel prior to your original check-out date. Please advise the hotel of any changes to your dates before arriving at the hotel to ensure no extra charges occur. Overflow Hotel: There is a strong likelihood that the Hilton Airport will sell out of rooms at the group rate. Please make your hotel reservation first, and then proceed with the activity registration form. The 384th Bomb Group Board of Directors invite you to our 2017 Reunion, in conjunction with the 2017 Reunion of the Eighth Air Force Historical Society (8AFHS) in New Orleans, Louisiana, Wednesday, 27 September to Sunday, 1 October. Information on this page is provided to assist 384th Members in planning for and preparing to attend our reunion; additional pages contain the official reunion documents and forms.

#### IMPORTANT 384th NOTES:

- Reserve your hotel room NOW! Yes, even before you register for the Reunion.
- Plan to arrive (at least) by Friday night by 7:00PM for the 384th Rendezvous Dinner.
- Select a Meal Package OR 'Separately Priced Meals' that include the Rendezvous Dinner.
- Be sure the 384th Bomb Group is entered as your group affiliation on the registration form.

#### **MEAL PLAN OPTIONS:**

- If you are like me and plan to arrive on **Wednesday** (or before), you can sign up for Meal Plan #1 (breakfast and dinner Thursday-Saturday, breakfast Sunday).
- Or, if you plan to arrive on Thursday, you can sign up for Meal Plan #2 (breakfast and dinner Friday-Saturday, breakfast Sunday). If arrival at the hotel is before 6:00PM, you can also select the Thursday Dinner Buffet under 'Separately Priced Meals.'
- Or, if you plan to arrive on Friday early enough for the Rendezvous Dinner at 7:00PM sign

# MAKE YOUR HOTEL RESERVATIONS FIRST!!!!

#### CHISEL CHIN AND ME

Right now I am downshifting seventy years. Think that is easy? Well try it then when you are ninety-four. Seventy years or so ago I was a Technical Sergeant Radio Operator with the 547th Bomb Squadron of the 384th Bomb Group at Grafton Underwood, England. I had already completed twenty-one bomb runs over hostile Nazi targets and the worst mission of all was the last one over a neutral target in Pilsen, Czecho-slovakia, the Skoda Armament Works. Since the mission was over a neutral territory, the Briefing Officer warned our Bombardiers not to realease their bombs unless the factory could be clearly seen. Either due to low hanging clouds or smoke from previous bombings, the factory was obscured, which required three bomb runs through intense anti-aircraft fire before "Bombs Away!" Upon landing, I counted over fifty shrapnel holes through the thin aluminum skin of our Boeing B-17, including an 88mm hole through the right wing spar, which, if it had detonated, would have required someone else to write this story.



Okay, just what has this to do with Chisel Chin? Actually, nothing directly. With or without the Skoda mission, I probably would have spent the evening in the Zebra Club, the enlisted men's watering hole on our Army Air Corps base. I was nursing my second or third flat English beer when the CQ entered the room and yelled out, "Lustig!" Being summoned at that time of the day was not a good omen, so I meekly replied, "Here." "Report to operations!" came the reply. The flight was about a half hour hop to an RAF base hear an American General Hospital in Manchester, England. A staff car was wairing to deliver our ground-pounding officers to a dance at the hospital while it dropped us enlisted crew members off at a pub in Manchester.

I never felt at ease in an English pub because of the unfriendly glances of the English men who saw American airmen as the culprits who were sleeping with their wives and daughters, while they were slogging it out from D-Day forward across Holland and France and into hostile Germany. Of course, many American Gls were enduring the same miserable conditions. In an effort to ease our loneliness, our Base Commander trucked in a load of English women, mostly married, affection starved, housewives they collected off the streets of Manchester and Kettering. It was then and there that I met Chisel Chin. She made it clear from the start that she was a married woman. Whether she was an affection starved housewife or not, I never found out - obviously no source of disappointment for either of us at the time.

Chisel Chin was a far better dancer than I was and not an unpleasant conversationalist to boot. When the bell rang ten o'clock, and we all headed for the bus stop, I remember wondering whether or not I should kiss her goodbye. It was a moot question. While we crowded around the bus door, the driver decided to get off the bus. As we backed up to give him room, I felt myself sliding, face down, feet first into a ditch about eight feet deep. As I crawled up out of the ditch, the bus pulled away and I started the half mile trudge back to my tent. It was then that I pictured Chisel Chin smiling all the way back to Kettering - by a stroke of good luck, she had avoided having to give me the traditional goodnight kiss.

## Logistics, I Don't Know What it is, But I Want Some of it!

The night of 19 February 1944 found England shrouded under a heavy cloud cover, but the weather over Germany was breaking. While the murk might complicate getting away and possibly landing, General Spaatz had made his decision—"Let 'em go." What was to be called the Big Week (20-25 February 1944) had begun. The next day, 20 February, saw the largest force of aircraft up to that time take off and head for targets in Germany. England literally shook under the roar of engines—some 1,004 bomber aircraft plus their fighter escorts.

The primary objective of Big Week was to direct a strategic bombing campaign against the Luftwaffe that would destroy its means to continue the war and, as a result, gain air superiority before Operation Overlord. Bomber operations were conducted principally by the Eighth Air Force, with support from both the Fifteenth Air Force and the Royal Air Force (RAF). In-theater logistics support, the key element that allowed the Eighth Air Force to kick off Big Week, came from the VIII Air Force Service Command (AFSC). A measure of the magnitude of this logistics effort is seen in the number of bomber aircraft generated—VIII AFSC made 1,292 bombers available, an unprecedented number. However, many other facets of logistics support, often on a scale never seen before, were also necessary for Big Week. These include preparation—industrial mobilization, unit buildup and beddown, stateside logistics support, facility expansion and modernization, training and equipping of personnel, and organization of air logistics activities. As is often the case, much of the planning, preparation, and execution of the Eighth's bombing operations was subject to uncertainties that made logistics support difficult and required improvisation on the part of both logistics organizations and logistics leadership.

During 1943-1944, the average life of an Eighth Air Force heavy bomber was 215 days, during which it flew missions on 47 days and was undergoing maintenance, repair, or modification on 49 days. The quality of maintenance was often the margin of difference between the life or death of an aircrew or the success or failure of a mission. The greatly increased rate of operations, the high incidence of battle damage, and the growing complexity of military planes during World War II made maintenance one of the most vital functions in waging an air war.
