384th joins 8th AFHS in Washington for a reunion to remember

Memorial and museum tours, dinners, chance encounters make for a capital visit

Our 384th reunion, held 19-23 October in conjunction with the 8th Air Force Historical Society gathering, brought us to the nation's capital, providing the nearly 20 members of the 384th with a memorable experience and many opportunities to connect, reconnect and build upon the relationships that Keep The Show on the Road.

Among the highlights of the five-day event in Washington, D.C. was a private tour of the Smithsonian's Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Center at Washington Dulles International Airport. In the restoration area, our group had a chance to see several interesting projects underway, including restoration of a BF-109 and also *Shoo Shoo Baby*, one of the few surviving B-17s that actually saw combat during World War II (see another picture from this visit, **page 2**).

A tour visit to Arlington National Cemetery was so memorable that some of our group made multiple visits from our headquarters hotel (more on **page 4**). Another tour took us to the many monuments on the National Mall, including the World War II memorial. In our 384th hospitality room, we also had a great Hangar Thirteen display (more on **page 6**).

When groups such as the 384th attend the 8th AFHS reunion, we are offered the opportunity to have a "rendezvous dinner" with our attendees only; this year, we were joined for our rendezvous dinner by



the contingent representing the <u>385th Bomb Group</u>. This group also flew B-17s, from Great Ashfield. We have extended a warm invitation to this group to join us for our next visit to the U.K., as Great Ashfield is not that far from Grafton Underwood, and we see the opportunity to join forces and enjoy economies of scale for several planned events, including a visit to the Imperial War Museum at Duxford for the <u>Battle of Britain Air Show</u>.

The board has decided the "initial" dates for our return to Grafton Underwood (see story, **Page 3**), where we expect to see quite a difference in the clearing and preparation for the museum that the Friends of the 384th are shepherding to completion over the next few years.

The digital future of our newsletter (and other publications we respect)

During the 48th Annual 8th Air Force Historical Society Reunion business meeting October 22, the society took a difficult step with its well-regarded glossy magazine: It will no longer be printed. This change will save the 8th AFHS \$25,000 a year. That figure, by the way, is a 40 percent increase over production costs from just three years ago!

For a few years, the board of the 384th has also weighed whether to publish digitally only, or primarily. We've now decided to publish digitally and provide **printed copies to those who request them**. Our mailing list, understandably, is much smaller than that of the 8th AFHS, so the impact on members should be much smaller. And there will be several benefits:

- You will receive the newsletter more quickly via e-mail, as it takes time (and effort) to print, affix mailing labels, etc.
- Live links in the electronic version will take you to all the internet resources referenced in a newsletter issue.
- The cost of printing and mailing the newsletter is also an important expense for the 384th. And it's just a fact: many mailed copies are returned every issue because we don't have the right addresses, so we'll save money.
- And because the newsletter will now be primarily digital, your editor will no longer be thinking about the added cost of
 mailing and printing (in other words, more content, more pictures, more stories every issue!).

As noted elsewhere (see articles, page 1 and page 3), we have invited the 385th Bomb Group to join us on our 2023 Junket.

The 385th was well represented in

Washington. The 385th has a history of visits to England, reunions and other activities.

As well, Brig. Gen. Paul W. Tibbets IV, USAF Ret., may be joining us, along with his family. Tibbets is the grandson of Brig. Gen. Paul W. Tibbets Jr., who flew the B-29 Enola Gay on the first nuclear mission in World War II. Tibbets Jr. also has a tie to Grafton Underwood; while a member of the 97th Bomb Group, he flew the first B-17 mission over occupied Europe from Grafton Underwood (for nearly all of its time in the U.K., the 97th was based at Polebrook).

Frank Alfter, our president, and Neill Howarth, of Friends of the 384th, talked with Tibbets several times during the 8th AFHS

reunion, including during our tour of the Smithsonian's Steven F. Udvar-Hazy museum annex (see picture above of Paul W. Tibbets IV with Neill and 384th member Rosie McNair at the Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Center, in front of Enola Gay, flown by Tibbets' grandfather). Stay tuned for more on both of these opportunities!

384th plans September 2023 Memorial Junket XII to Grafton Underwood

Board and member conversations at the recent reunion in Washington, D.C., and over the last three years, have confirmed the broad interest of the 384th Bomb Group to return to Grafton Underwood in 2023.

The dates for our return have been "tentatively" set for Thursday 14 September through Tuesday 19 September. While

Carol Alfter has begun working with Helen Warrington of Arena Travel, many details remain to be determined, especially whether the 385th Bomb Group will join us, and how their participation will affect pricing and plans. As well, based upon previous Junkets, it's highly likely that visitors from the U.S. will either plan to spend time in the U.K. for some days before and/or after the actual Junket.

The Thursday-Tuesday initial dates are based upon the 384th's historical approach, most recently in 2019, to the activities during the Junket. These are expected to begin with Wednesday arrivals for our U.S. members (in 2019 we stayed at a hotel near Heathrow that night) before venturing north by motor coach to establish our home base at a hotel in the Cambridge area.

From the hotel, all of our activities will be by motor coach. It's highly likely we will have a service and wreath-laying at the Grafton Underwood memorial on Saturday 16 September, plus likely excursions to old haunts such as the Star in Geddington (once frequented by 384th personnel). We're planning on attending the excellent Battle of Britain air show at the Imperial War Museum's Duxford location on Sunday 17 September, for which we were able to obtain Gold Experience VIP seating and privileges in 2019; this meant we were under cover in case of bad weather, had access to upgraded food and restroom

facilities, and we were right on the flight line! We're also working on a probable Monday visit to the Cambridge American Cemetery, where several 384th personnel are buried. In 2019, we laid wreaths and spent some time there in the beautiful chapel as well as honoring the graves of our 384th lost in action and still missing.

A true highlight of Memorial Junket XII will be the ability to tour the progress on the museum site now underway by the Friends of the 384th. Great progress has been made in the clearing of the site and with the financial and legal structures

Brick reclamation is a key activity at the 384th museum site, making it possible to add to the museum with bricks used in original construction. The Ops Block, at rear, is a main museum

necessary to make the museum possible.

As well, members of the 384th have been generous in donating personal funds to make the museum possible (please see last page for donation details). At press time, those donations from our members and friends have topped \$40,000. Thank you!



Hangar Thirteen makes a special appearance at 8th AFHS reunion

If seeing is believing, then it's surely time to believe in the <u>Hangar Thirteen</u> project that's deep into the process of rebuilding a famous B-17F of the 384th Bomb Group, *Lucky Thirteen*.

To demonstrate the progress of the project, Gerad Blume — key evangelist, official historian and hands-on participant — traveled to D.C. with his dad Gerald, toting a nearly complete cockpit instrument panel that they shared with our members

cockpit instrument panel that they shared with our members and interested visitors in the 384th hospitality suite.

The instrument panel itself is fashioned from wood – that's the only "mockup" portion of the panel. 384th next gen Bob Hachmann CAD modeled the dual mag switch linkage and it was 3D printed in aluminum. The panel and console was fabricated by Anton Hermans, a Dutchman in Thailand, whose family was deeply affected by the Chowhound food drops at the end of the war. The VHF control bracket was fabricated by Stijn Claus, a Belgian who runs the B-17 Parts Project. Gerad did the rest. Bob is now fabricating the housing for the instrument panel.

Hangar Thirteen was founded by Ray Moore as a means of paying tribute to the thousands of U.S. airmen who fought in history's largest aerial confrontation. Inspired by his great uncle, Marvin Hudson, Ray began rebuilding *Lucky Thirteen*. His great uncle was the line chief of the 546th Squadron, and the sole surviving photo of *Lucky Thirteen* shows him supervising repair work nearby.

Lucky Thirteen will be unique — one of only two surviving late B-17Fs, the only one to have seen combat. She will be the only surviving B-17 to pay tribute to those aircrews who fought and died in the bombing campaigns against aircraft factories and ball-bearing plants in the autumn of 1943.

Clearing reveals more of 384th museum site at Grafton Underwood; anticipation grows

Friends of the 384th chairman Neill Howarth had several inperson conversations about progress at the future 384th museum site during the recent 8th AFHS reunion in Washington.

Neill reports that details for legal sign-off are in progress. Volunteers are getting ready for heavy plant machinery at the site and are preparing for 2023, which will be the 80th anniversary of the 384th at Grafton Underwood. The plan is to mark the anniversary during the September 16 Junket XII visit. Thanks to the work of dedicated volunteers, the Operations Building that will be at the core of the planned museum complex has been cleared and secured for eventual restoration into a proper home for the U.K. history of the 384th Bomb Group. As that work continues, the group is tackling the area around that building.


